Created in 1997 by Indigenous communities from Yukon Territory, Canada and Alaska, USA, the YRITWC signatories now include 66 Tribal and First Nation governments. Throughout the Watershed and across the international border, the leadership and staff of the Watershed Council work together with communities and supportive partners to clean and protect the water, species, and communities of the Yukon River Basin.

The YRITWC is an international organization with 501(c)3 nonprofit status in the United States and Societal Status in Canada.

BACKHAUL & SOLID WASTE



Has removed over ten-thousand tons of abandoned vehicles and equipment in four years of backhaul while training solid waste technicians in villages to remove and recycle fuels, chemicals, and electronics.

SCIENCE
Collects and analyzes water quality data in collaboration with USGS and trained village technicians in an effort to create a baseline dataset of the entire watershed. Through standardized protocols, uses science to effectively assess impacts of climate change and identify contamination sources while incorporating local traditional knowledge of the River's cycles.



CAPACITY BUILDING



Strengthens community resources by facilitating administrative and financial management trainings and distributing guidebooks and consultation in accounting practices, audit preparation, and strategic planning.

The Yukon River flows from the Yukon Territory in Canada across the great State of Alaska. The entire watershed spans over 330,000 square miles.

50 YEAR VISION:

Each Department strives to achieve this vision through the guidance of elders and leadership, the expertise of our partners, and a focus on youth engagement and education.



SUSTAINABLE LANDS

Conducts brownfield site inventories in communities, provides assessments to high priority sites, and builds local capacity through training and education to address contaminated sites within the watershed.



ENERGY
Assists Tribes and First Nations with education, training, and implementation of renewable energy, conservation, and efficiency programs. In July 2008, in partnership with the Tribe, City, and local utility in Ruby, AK, installed the first successful hydrokinetic river turbine in the United States, producing electricity directly from the Yukon River with no dams or water diversions.

ADVOCACY & EDUCATION

Engages communities in ongoing issues of interest, strengthens opportunities for youth environmental education, and ensures that the Indigenous peoples of the Watershed have a voice in policy and resource development decisions affecting the region.
